

President's Report

It was a humbling experience to represent ASMR this year, a society with a proud history at the forefront of advocacy for the sector. Despite the challenges we have all faced due to the pandemic, I have enjoyed every minute of my presidency.

I had productive meetings with a range of stakeholders including Chris Bowen (Shadow Minister for Health), Jane Rice (Greens Spokesperson for Science, Research and Innovation), Kylie Wright (Senior Advisor for Greg Hunt, Minister for Health), Anne-Marie Elias (Senior Advisor for Karen Andrews, Minister for Industry, Science and Technology), Alan Finkel (Australia's Chief Scientist), Jane Halton (Spokesperson Health, National COVID-19 Commission), Anne Kelso (CEO of the NHMRC), Trent Zimmerman (Chair of Standing Committee on Health, Aged Care and Sport) and Jaala Pulford (Victorian Minister for Innovation, Medical Research and the Digital Economy).

I am proud to have led an organisation that despite many changes and challenges over the years is still the leading voice of the sector. What sets ASMR apart from other organisations is that we represent the concerns of everyone in the sector without fear or favour, we are fiercely independent and truly bipartisan.

Australia has fared exceptionally well through the pandemic compared to other countries. A major reason for this is that the Government has sought expert advice and implemented evidence-based policies, providing an excellent model for how governments can operate effectively. Our success is also based on the substantial contribution from our world-class health and medical research workforce.

We have welcomed the Government's substantial efforts to steer the economy through these difficult times. The Federal Budget saw record spending to get us out of recession, including \$1B for universities, \$460M for the CSIRO and other measures. While these are welcome, it is just a fraction of what has been already cut from the sector before the pandemic. Other countries that have suffered much larger outbreaks and economic downturns such as France, Germany, Sweden and Canada are now investing additional billions in science and technology. These governments have realised that such measures will not only help enormously in combating this pandemic but also future health emergencies, thereby leading to a faster and more sustainable knowledge-based economic recovery compared to a fossil fuel led one proposed in Australia.

Substantial long-term investment is needed to maintain Australia's critical science and research capability, considering the financial holes COVID-19 has generated. Australia's steadily declining industry R&D, an expanded foreign investment law restricting overseas R&D funding and the problematic Job-Ready Graduates Bill, only adds to the looming disaster the sector is facing. Most medical research is undertaken at Universities and without new funding, a substantial workforce reduction is inevitable. Recent changes will also increase the costs for STEM courses, contradicting the Governments intentions. With the additional drastic cut to the "base research" component of the Commonwealth Grants Scheme, Australia will quickly fall behind internationally.

Having enjoyed a free university education in Germany, I have always been impressed that Australia and Germany have a very similar number of Universities in the world top 100, despite a much smaller population and only a fraction of the funding. This is a testament to the hard work of everyone that has dedicated their life to addressing the world's most pressing challenges. It is very concerning that this is something seen as dispensable by decision-makers in Canberra.

The sector needs suitable solutions to cover the increasing indirect costs of research and the stagnation of investment into fundamental discovery science. Future health and economic prosperity can only be achieved with appropriate funding and we need to maintain both ends of the research pipeline, from basic discovery to translation and commercialisation.

The budget also saw the launch of a new Modern Manufacturing Strategy, building on science, research and technology. Joining the dots between research, product development and manufacturing is laudable and with Australia's world-class medical research sector we indeed have a golden opportunity to grow new industries that are manufacturing locally, creating jobs and prosperity. The research underpinning new medical devices, therapies and diagnostics is conducted by dedicated medical researchers and with a declining NHMRC budget, we have unfortunately missed this opportunity. The hope that big Pharma will keep local medical manufacturing going is dwindling quickly. Similar to the car industry, recent weeks saw several

continued

announcements by major players (GSK, Pfizer) closing their local operations with severe job losses. This happens even in growth areas such as sterile injectables or respiratory products. The Australian market is just too small for overseas companies to produce locally. However, Australia can be competitive when it comes to high-value medical goods (devices, diagnostics and therapies) developed and produced locally for the world market, as demonstrated by companies such as CSL or ResMed. This is what we should strive for and support by adequate investment in medical research.

Two thirds of the US public would support paying more taxes to fund scientific research, according to a survey commissioned by the advocacy group Research America. Given that Australia's medical research has a proven and enviable track record when it comes to return on investment (over \$3 for \$1 invested), more taxpayer-funded investment in the sector is one of the smartest things governments can do. At no time has this aspect of policymaking become more crucial than in the wake of this global pandemic.

NHMRC

The NHMRC has delivered significant health and economic returns through the distribution of research funding based on an open, transparent expert review and clearly defined management processes. However, investment into the NHMRC has declined in real terms over many years, resulting in historically low funding success rates, especially for mid-career researchers in the Investigator Grant Scheme. It is particularly concerning that many applicants that missed out had scored very highly (Category 6). These researchers are clearly at the top of their game and will have plenty of opportunities to move overseas and pursue their career dreams. Without additional funding, the current "brain drain" will just further accelerate. The federal health care spending is now forecast to \$115B pa and we are dependent on these emerging star researchers to deliver the innovations required for better treatments and diagnostics that will be able to reduce exploding health budgets. Losing high-calibre mid-career researchers to other countries will leave Australia highly vulnerable to address those challenges. We need a well-supported, world-class health and medical sector now more than ever and the ASMR will continue to advocate for more urgent support for the NHMRC.

MRFF

The MRFF has been designed for translation and bringing health products to market. It can't thrive without well-funded, curiosity-driven research feeding into the translational pipeline. However, with fundamental discovery research in decline, many are voicing their concerns that the MRFF is mainly supporting the translation of overseas discoveries. If ASMR's calls for further investment into the NHMRC are continued to be ignored, the substantial investment into the MRFF will be devalued, because the economic benefits of the clinical translation will also be exported overseas and not based on homegrown inventions and discoveries. We need to

ensure that the intellectual medical research capital built by the NHMRC will become the main economic pillar for the successes of the MRFF.

Since its inception in 2014, it has been apparent that the disbursement processes of the MRFF are flawed. Australian researchers and clinicians have expressed concerns about the lack of funding and peer review transparency. Therefore, the ASMR is highly supportive of the potential MRFF audit to be conducted in 2021 by the Australian National Audit Office. Our submission was accompanied by a media campaign to raise awareness, build momentum and urge the sector to get behind the audit. The response from the sector was overwhelming and many researchers and clinicians have contacted us to report their stories.

The audit was also discussed at a recent Senate Estimates Hearing and the Department of Health was put on notice to provide a list of all potential meetings with lobbyists in relation to the MRFF. These are welcome developments to ensure full accountability for MRFF disbursements and we will continue to build public pressure so the MRFF audit will go ahead, and that the transparency and governance mechanisms can be improved for the benefit of the health and medical research sector, and the health of the nation. We strongly believe that medical research funding should not be left to professional lobbyists and their well-funded organisations, who launch glossy marketing campaigns to attract taxpayer dollars to research areas.

It has been an honour to be part of such a historic and exceptional organisation. I would like to acknowledge and thank all the directors I have worked with this year. They have all given their time and commitment to the ASMR and it has been a privilege to work with you all. A special thank you goes to past president Dr Roger Yazbek who encouraged me to take on the presidency, for his trust and support and the ASMR advisory group for invaluable advice. Thanks to all the State committee members for their hard work and enthusiasm in an exceptionally difficult year for everyone.

I would like to thank my wife, Michaela and our sons, Alexander and Sebastian, for their support this year and over my entire career. My success in life would not have been possible without them. My sons have inherited my passion for science, studying Experimental Physics and Bioinformatics at the University of Melbourne. I hope they can have productive careers in an Australia that more adequately supports fundamental discovery science and our great universities.

Finally, I would like to acknowledge Cath West, Priscilla Diment and Katriona Christiansen for their tireless work behind the scenes and I wish Priscilla all the best for her well-deserved retirement after 14 years of exceptional service for ASMR.

The Society is in good hands with the incoming President, Dr Ryan Davis and I wish him all the best for a successful year 2021. I look forward to continuing to serve on the ASMR Board under Ryan's leadership.

Minutes of the Annual General Meeting of the Australian Society for Medical Research, held at the Maritime Museum, Fremantle, Western Australia on Thursday, November 21st 2019, commencing at 1:10pm

Item 1 Welcome and Apologies – Dr Roger Yazbek

In the presence of the required quorum of members, in person and by proxy, Dr Roger Yazbek opened the meeting at 1:10pm, welcoming all present. Apologies were tabled from Associate Professors Elizabeth Williams, Kieran Scott, Peter O’Loughlin, Paul Dawson, Stella Clark, Tony Kenna, Professors Maria Kavallaris and Mark Hulett, Drs Emma Parkinson-Lawrence, Erin McGillick, Lila Landowski, Ryan Davis and Mrs Ruth Lilian

Item 2 Confirmation of Minutes of 21/11/18 - Dr Roger Yazbek

Dr Kevin Keane moved that the Minutes of the AGM of 21st November 2018 be accepted as a true and

accurate reflection of that meeting; seconded by Dr Daniel Johnstone.

Item 3 President’s Report – Dr Roger Yazbek

Dr Yazbek advised that his report would have a political advocacy focus as other directors would report on their portfolios.

He spoke of the year past as a turbulent and volatile time for the health and medical research (HMR) sector. The first experience of the new grant program through the NHMRC prompted a community response which ASMR has been aware of. We have liaised regularly with NHMRC to get the facts to disseminate to the membership and the sector.

In the lead up to the federal election, ASMR was incredibly active.

We contacted all candidates, making them aware of HMR and providing them with a position document outlining four key areas which need to be addressed to improve the sector. Two key points within that document centred around increased investment into HMR and increased transparency and oversight in the dissemination of research funds. There was a positive response from all who received the document. Major political parties and independents replied and the level of response indicates there are opportunities to pursue and we will continue to

encourage government to understand the value of HMR.

Following the election there have been meetings with politicians making them aware of the issues and exerting pressure on them to drive change in the sector.

Dr Yazbek advised that he has had political engagement and meetings with around twenty individuals over the last two years as ASMR President. Ministers, shadow ministers, bureaucrats, advisers, officers of the Departments of Treasury and Finance and recently with Celia Gleeson, Advisor to Karen Andrews, Minister for Industry, Science and Technology, Chris Bowen (and his adviser Andrew Garrett), Shadow Minister for Health, Katie Allen, Member for Higgins, Adam Bandt, Member for Melbourne, Brendan O'Connor, Shadow Minister for Employment and Industry, Shadow Minister for Science, Shadow Minister for Small and Family Business, Emily Bourke, Member of South Australian Legislative Council and Jenny Aitchison, NSW Legislative Assembly, Shadow Minister for Medical Research. There has also been engagement with other politicians during ASMR MRW®.

These meetings inform and educate politicians on the value of HMR as well as issues facing the sector around stability, peer review and lack of transparency. This is the core business of ASMR, advocating on behalf of the membership and the sector. We have made some inroads with positive responses from the Opposition and several independents, culminating in 'Questions in writing' being put to the Minister for Health. Questions focussed on why no increase to NHMRC and why a perceived lack of transparency around the MRFF.

ASMR has proposed an evidence-based business model to tie

investment in HMR to 3% of the total health expenditure in this country. The Society will continue pushing this model under the leadership of Christoph Hagemeyer and the incoming directors.

There were no questions in respect of the President's report.

Item 4 Treasurer's Report – Dr Daniel Johnstone

Dr Johnstone referred to the Independent Auditor's Report contained with the Annual Report of the Society advising that there was a loss through the general account which was offset by income from ASN conference account resulting in an overall break-even situation. The Society has net assets in cash and property amounting to almost \$1.5M. Dr Johnstone thanked members and sponsors for their support.

There were no questions in respect of the audited accounts.

Item 5 ASMR Research Fund – Dr Daniel Johnstone

Dr Johnstone referred again to the Independent Auditor's Report advising that donations in the financial year covered the \$7000 disbursed to the award winners. He reminded members that donations to the fund are tax deductible.

Award Winner 2019

The 2019 International Award winner is Dr Kristen Barrett from ANU. Dr Barrett will visit the MRC Harwell Institute in Oxfordshire, UK to further her studies on congenital heart defects.

Award Winner 2018 (International) - Dr Nicole van der Burg

Dr Johnstone advised that Dr van der Burg was unable to be present but provided a video presentation summarizing her time in the laboratory of Prof Marcus Maurer at the Department of Dermatology and Allergy, Charité – Universtätsmedizin Berlin, conducting her study on "*Suitability of diagnostic microneedles in sampling skin for markers of*

chronic spontaneous urticaria". Dr van der Burg expressed her thanks to ASMR for the award which allowed her to take up this opportunity.

Award Winner 2018 (Domestic) – Dr Lucy Furfaro

Dr Johnstone introduced Dr Furfaro who spoke of her visit to the laboratory of Dr Jeremy Barr, School of Biological Sciences, Monash University, Victoria which facilitated her study "*Bacteriophage transfer across maternal membranes*". She concluded by thanking the Society for the Research Fund Domestic Award 2018.

Item 6 Sub-committee Reports

i. Membership - Dr Ryan Davis

Dr Yazbek, reported on behalf of Dr Davis, advising that there are currently 1290 financial members of the society, 74 affiliated organisations and 16 associate members. These networks allow ASMR to reach out to 120,000 people with a direct interest in health and medical research.

There are also 75 undergraduate subscriber members. This is a recent innovation offering free membership to undergraduates.

Dr Yazbek urged all present to encourage colleagues to join the society.

ii. Professional Development – Prof Mark Hulett

Dr Yazbek reported that two directors stepped down earlier this year for personal reasons. Prof Hulett took over their portfolios but is unfortunately unable to be here today.

Dr Yazbek spoke of the "Selling yourself on paper" session at the conference which involved a panel discussion around the theme of investigator grants. The session provided valuable insights and skills to all attending.

iii. Communications/Newsletter – Prof Mark Hulett

The 2019 Medallist, Dr Elizabeth Finkel was an inspiring speaker who highlighted the impact which health and medical research can have on the lives of people suffering previously incurable diseases.

In conclusion, Dr Masters thanked the hard-working state committees for their efforts in organising these events across the country and her co-directors, expressing her pride in being part of the week and part of the ASMR Board.

v. Media - Dr Laura Masters

Dr Masters reported that she took over the portfolio in July and has learned a lot about communications in a short time. She advised of an increase in social media traffic.

vi. NSC 2019 - Dr Kevin Keane/
Prof Claudine Bonder

Dr Kean reported that the 58th ASMR NSC is the first NSC to be held in Western Australia and that there are just over 100 delegates enjoying the meeting. Prof Bonder thanked sponsors and trade supporters. She also thanked and congratulated the committee for their hard work as well as Cath

West and Priscilla Diment in the Executive Office.

In conclusion she congratulated all first-time speakers. Dr Keane advised that the NSC 2020 will take place in Melbourne.

Operating Result

The consolidated operating loss of the Society for the financial year amounted to \$88,383.

Review of Operations

At the end of the financial year the Society had net assets of \$1,385,868.

During the year, events management was undertaken by ASN Events Pty Limited, on behalf of the Society. On an accruals basis, they have reported net assets of \$75,913, which includes \$20,000 liability to the Society, revenue of \$0 and a net loss of \$529 after taking into consideration other interest income of \$171. This year, the Australian Health & Medical Research Congress Unit Trust was non active during the 2020 financial year.

The Society's branch accounting is undertaken by the National Office.

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards, Australian Interpretations and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001 (as amended). The Australian Society for Medical Research complies with all Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in their entirety.

Significant Changes in the State of Affairs

No significant changes in the company's state of affairs occurred during the financial year other than as mentioned in this report. The Society's accounting policy is on an accruals basis. Accordingly the comparative figures reflect the accruals basis of accounting.

Principal Activities

The principal activities of the company during the course of the year were Public, political and scientific advocacy on behalf of health and medical researchers and research. Promoting understanding of the value of, and need for health and medical research for the benefit of all. No significant change in the nature of these activities occurred during the year.

After Balance Date Events

No matters or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may

significantly affect the operations of the company, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the company in subsequent financial years.

Future Developments

The Society expects to maintain the present status and level of operations and hence there are no likely developments in the operations in future financial years.

Environmental Issues

The Society's operations are not regulated by any significant environmental regulation under a law of the Commonwealth or of a State or Territory.

Director's Benefits

Since the date of incorporation, no office bearer has received or has become entitled to receive a benefit (other than a benefit included in the aggregate amount of emoluments or due and receivable by office bearers shown in the accounts or the fixed salary of a full-time employee of the Society) because of a contract made by the Society with the office bearer, or with a firm which the office bearer is a member or an entity in which the office bearer has a substantial financial interest.

Notes to the Financial Statement for the year ended 30 June 2020

Note 1: Statement of Significant Accounting Policies

The financial report is a general purpose financial report that has been prepared in accordance with Accounting Standards and other authoritative pronouncements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the requirements of the Corporations Act 2001 (as amended).

The Company is limited by guarantee. Other than the retention of net earnings for the year, there have been no changes in equity during the year.

The following is a summary of the material accounting policies adopted by the economic entity in the preparation of the financial report. The accounting policies have been consistently applied, unless otherwise stated.

(a) Going Concern

The Society's financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis. As at 30 June 2020, the Society had an excess of current assets over current liabilities. Cash reserves were sufficient to support the Society's operations.

(b) Basis of Preparation

Australian Equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards

The Society has prepared financial statements in accordance with the Australian equivalents to International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS).

The accounting policies set out below have been consistently applied to all years presented. The entities have however elected to adopt exemptions available under AASB 1 relating to AASB 132: Financial Instruments: Disclosure and Presentation, and AASB 139: Financial Instruments: Recognition and Measurement.

The financial report has been prepared on an accrual basis and is based on historical costs modified by the revaluation of selected non-current assets, and financial assets and financial liabilities for which the fair value basis of accounting has been applied, if applicable.

Functional and Presentation Currency

The Society's financial reports are presented in Australian dollars.

(c) Accounting Policies

Income tax

As the Society is a charitable institution in terms of subsection 50-5 of the Income Tax Assessment Act, 1997, as amended, it is exempt from paying income tax.

Property, Plant and Equipment

a) Property

The property (Suite 702,37 Bligh Street, Sydney) valuation was reviewed by Brian Dowling Commercial Real Estate Agents in 2016. The Agent noted an estimated increase in valuation of \$133,646. This material increase was factored into the 2016 Audited Financial Accounts by the Directors. The property market valuation shall be reviewed in the 2021 financial year. An appraisal conducted by Brian Dowling on the 23rd September 2020 indicated current valuation of \$840,000.

b) Plant and equipment

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from those assets.

The Society is a non profit organisation and there are no changes to its current disclosure requirements under AASB 116 par Aus 77.1

c) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognised in the profit and loss on a diminishing basis over the estimated useful life of each asset. The depreciation rates used for the 2020 year and 2019 year was as follows:

Impairment of Assets

At each reporting date, the directors review the carrying values of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such an indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs to sell and value in use, is compared to the asset's carrying value

Any excess of the assets carrying value over its recoverable amount is expensed to the income statement. Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

Investments in Associates

Any Investments in associate companies are recognised in the financial statements by applying the equity method of accounting. The equity method of accounting recognises the company's share of post-acquisition reserves of its associates. The Society's interests in joint venture entities are brought to account using the cost method.

Members Liability

The Society is limited by guarantee. Every member of the Society undertakes to contribute to the assets of the Society in the event of the same being wound up during the time that he or she is a member or within one year afterwards for payment of the debts and liabilities of the Society contracted before the time at which he or she ceases to be a member and of the costs, charges and expenses of winding up the same and for the adjustment of the rights of the contributors amongst themselves such amount as may be required not exceeding the sum of \$20.

Sponsorship

Sponsorship revenue is recognised at the time the pledge is made.

Provisions and Employee entitlements

Provision is made for the liability for employee entitlements arising from services rendered by employees to balance date. Employee entitlements expected to be settled within one year together with entitlements arising from wages and salaries, annual leave and sick leave which will be settled after one year, have been measured at their nominal amount. Contributions are made by the Society to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and Cash Equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks or financial institutions, other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of twelve months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within short term borrowings in current liabilities on the balance sheet.

Revenue

Interest revenue is recognised on a proportional basis taking in to account the interest rates applicable to the financial assets.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax (GST).

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Taxation Office. In these circumstances, the GST is recognised as part of the cost of acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense.

Receivables and payables in the balance sheet are shown inclusive of GST. Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

The accompanying notes form part of these financial statements.

Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgments incorporated into the financial report based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data, obtained both externally and internally.

Key Estimates - Impairment

The directors assess impairment at each reporting date by evaluating conditions specific to the group that may lead to impairment of assets. Where an impairment trigger exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is determined. Value-in-use calculations performed in assessing recoverable amounts incorporate a number of key estimates.

Agency Agreement

The Society has entered into an Agency Agreement with ASN Pty Ltd. From the Society's perspective, there is no change in the way ASN Pty Ltd manage events for the Society.

Nature and Purpose of Retained Earnings

The retained earnings of the Society are set aside for the future expansion of the economic entity, The Australian Society for Medical Research.
