"We have a moral obligation to treat and prevent disease"

International ethics expert, and ASMR Medallist 2005, **Professor Julian Savulescu** says that we are morally obliged to enhance our children's health and well-being and that rapidly developing genetic technologies could be a way to achieve this.

"Genetic technology is a rapidly developing reality. If this can provide us with the ability to enhance more effectively our children's well-being, to give them better opportunities of a better life, to fail to do so will be to be responsible for the consequences, including their unhappiness," Professor Savulescu said.

"Our future is in our hands. By not allowing ethical genetic enhancement using emerging technologies, we are choosing to enter <u>Nature's lottery</u> rather than utilising safe and cost-effective interventions which may radically improve our health and well-being," said Professor Savulescu.

Professor Savulescu is the Uehiro Chair in Practical Ethics, University of Oxford and Director, Oxford Uehiro Centre for Practical Ethics, Oxford UK.
