The Congress was the brain-child of Professor Steve Wesselingh (now Director of the Burnet Institute in Melbourne), during his ASMR Presidency in 1998.

Aims and Hypothesis:

The underlying hypothesis was simply, that since fundamental biological mechanisms are relevant across disciplines, scientists from disparate research areas who rarely meet, probably have a lot to offer each other. The primary aim of the Congress was thus to bring together scientists from different research areas to promote crosspollination between disciplines.

Results:

The overwhelming response from the scientific community indicated that our hypothesis was true.

- Registrations from the 25 participating specialty societies topped 2000.
- The program featured 36 invited international speakers and over 700 free communications.

The biggest dilemma faced by most delegates was which, of the up to 10 concurrent sessions including over 200 invited speakers, to attend.

Throughout the week the trade/poster/meals area had an interactive vibe and provided a great venue to cement collaborations. Plans for collaborative experiments, grants and papers were hatched during tea breaks, lunchtimes and happy hours.

The dinner, attended by Senator Kay Patterson, the Commonwealth Minister for Health and Ageing was another highlight. Master magician Tim Ellis and international guest speaker and good sport, John O'Shea were closely scrutinized but still managed to amaze the cynical scientific audience.


